This weekend we celebrate the "unofficial" end of summer with Labor Day on Monday, Sept. 7th. It is truly a day to set aside and "relax" and salute EVERYONE – from our founders to the present - who have contributed in every varied way to our country. It is also a special day to again thank God for all that we have and all that we share!

Today's first reading is very apropos for this commemoration as well as we have beautiful poetic words from Isaiah telling a troubled people whose hearts are filled with fear and hopelessness of a world redeemed by God's saving power. "Be strong, fear not! Here is your God, he comes with vindication; with divine recompense he comes to save you." When the people of the kingdom of Judah were threatened by their enemies, God took pity on their fear and hopelessness. He sent Isaiah with a message that strengthened them. There will always be times of trouble, doubt, sickness or poverty in our lives. But let us never forget we are called to share His work of caring for those in need, the sick, and the poor among us.

What we see promised in the first reading we see fulfilled in today's Gospel when Jesus commands the deaf-mute man "Be Opened!" as He heals him. This encounter is more than a matter of physical healing. It is a sign of salvation. Further, what Jesus commands with respect to the deaf-mute man, He commands with respect to us. When we encounter Jesus, He commands, "Be opened!" and we too are healed: our ears are opened to hear the Good News and our tongues are loosened to proclaim it!

This Friday is the 14th Anniversary of Sept. 11th. After our noon Mass, we will remember and pray for all those who lost their lives and those still affected from illness resulting from this horrific terrorist attack on our country. We will also have Exposition of the Blessed Sacrament right after the Mass (and every Friday till 6 pm) where we can continue praying for all those in need and for peace in our world today. Please try to take some time out of your busy schedules to spend some time with Jesus in this way.


